Ohio Society Fall Meeting Point Pleasant, WV

The Ohio Society held its Fall Board of Management Meeting (BOM) at Point Pleasant, West Virginia on October 5, 2019 in conjunction with the Battle Days Event. The BOM discussed a recent request by the National Society to standardize on either the point system or event system for Color Guard Medals; insurance for firing of black powder; passed a resolution to award NSSAR Heroism Medals and a proclamation of recognition to six Dayton police officers; and approved a motion to investigate presenting the afore mentioned medals and proclamation at the same location as the Winter meeting held in Dayton, Ohio (see page 6 and 7 for more information). Workshops on promoting youth programs and on the soon to be released New Member Orientation Workbook were held.

Members of the Ohio Society Color Guard participated in the Battle Days Parade in Point Pleasant on Saturday morning. Ohio Members and spouses also enjoyed the Governors Dinner and Ball on Saturday night. On Sunday Ohio Society President Steve Hinson laid the Ohio Society Wreath and Venie Hinson laid the Ohio Ladies Auxiliary Wreath at Battle of Point Pleasant memorial service.

Ohio Masons Honor Rufus Putnam

In early September Ohio Society Color Guard Commanded Steve Frash received a request from Jeffrey Raines, Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Free & Accepted Masons of Ohio, for the Ohio Society Color Guard to lead a procession of over 1,000 members of the Free Masons from Marietta College to Mound Cemetery and the grave of Brigadier General Rufus Putnam. The Grand Lodge, formed in 1808, elected Rufus Putnam their first Grand Master.

The Ohio Society was very honored to be asked to support the Masons and answered the call to led the procession held on Friday, October 18, 2019. At the grave site the Masons had a brief memorial and placed a wreath at Putnam's grave.

This was a very historic occasion as Freemasonry entered the Northwest territory at Marietta in 1788. American Union Lodge originally met at Campus Martius. Despite the significance of Marietta to the Ohio Masons, the Annual Communication which meets annually had never been held in Marietta.





Central District Holds Annual Meeting and Memorial

The National Society Central District made up of the Ohio, Indiana, West Virginia and Kentucky Societies held its annual meeting in Lawrenceburg, IN on Friday October 25th and Saturday October 26th 2019. The business meeting was held on Saturday morning and dinners were held on Friday and Saturday evenings. National President General John T. (Jack) Manning and First Lady Sheila Manning were in

attendance for the weekend. The meeting was led by Central District Vice President General (VPG) William E. Sharp and Central District Officers.

On Saturday a grave marking and memorial ceremony was held at the battle and cemetery site of Col. Lochry's Massacre. On August 21, 1871, Col. Archibald Lochry led a division of Pennsylvania militia down the Ohio River attempting to join General George Rogers Clark who was mustering troops to attack Fort Detroit. Pulling ashore to eat and rest the militia was attacked by Indians who supported the British. Lochry and 30 of his 100 troops were killed. Prisoners were divided between several tribes and many were ultimately executed. Approximately thirty survived.

The memorial service was led by past VPG Tim Ward of the Ohio Society. Vice President General Sharp delivered the

Our Nations 250th Anniversary

The Revolutionary War 9 December 1775 – Great Bridge, VA.

The Virginia Council of Safety hoped to end Gov. Dunmore's raid on coastal towns and plantations by driving him from Norfolk. The Council ordered Col. William Woodford to station 1,000 militiamen at the southern end of the Great Bridge, a causeway spanning a swampy part of the Elizabeth River about ten miles from Norfolk. Dunmore with his motley troop about 200 regulars, some Loyalists and marines, and the "Loyal Ethiopians," as he called his recruited runaway black salves - occupied the other end. Dunmore's regulars attached but, bottlenecked on the causeway, they were easy targets. The patriots inflicted sixty causalities in half an hour, effectively neutralizing Dunmore's "army" while receiving only a single hand wound among their own ranks. With the militiamen in pursuit, Dunmore retreated to Norfolk, where he evacuated as many Tories as possible to ships in the harbor before abandoning the town to the rebels.
